Region IX takes up an area of 17,046.64 sq. km covering three provinces—Zamboanga del Norte, Zamboanga Sibugay, and Zamboanga del Sur.

Within these provinces are five vibrant cities—Dapitan, Dipolog, Pagadian, Zamboanga, and Isabela.

With its stunning natural sights, deeply rich culture, well-preserved history, and flavorful cuisine, Zamboanga Peninsula is a region travelers definitely want to experience again and again.





YAKAN WEAVING VILLAGE

The Yakan are an indigenous Muslim tribe from the southernmost region in the Philippines. These native sons of the Philippines now make a living selling their traditional Yakan woven products—considered to be among the finest in the whole country. Visitors can even watch the tribespeople turn brightly-colored thread into prismatic sheets using ancient techniques!



BOTTLED SPANISH SARDINES CAPITAL-DIPOLOG CITY

The capital of Zamboanga del Norte, Dipolog City, is known as the Bottled Sardines Capital of the Philippines. Their nearby shores are rich with sardines, influencing the local industries to produce lots of Spanish-style bottled sardines—a product that started as a gift from Spanish families to their friends.

ZAMBOANGA HERMOSA FESTIVAL AND REGATTA DE ZAMBOANGA

The Hermosa Festival is one of the biggest and most awaited festivals in the city and region. Festivities last the whole month of October. The highlights include a 9-day novena, fashion shows, dance and song competitions, trade fairs, a pageant, and the famous Regatta, which is a race of colorful vintas.



STA. CRUZ ISLAND, ZAMBOANGA CITY

It's no wonder this sun-drenched island was named one of the world's best beaches by National Geographic—travelers can truly find paradise here. With pink sand that glows under the sunlight, and calm waters dotted by colorful vintas and filtered by natural mangrove forests, this is one beach that definitely has to be seen to be believed!





MALAMAWI ISLAND, ISABELA CITY

If you love your privacy while on vacation, you're in for a treat. Malamawi Island offers uncrowded beaches with stretches of beautiful, white sand. Make sure you check out their open cottages, because you'll surely want to stay for a night or two.



RIZAL SHRINE, DAPITAN CITY


MT. TIMOLAN PROTECTED LANDSCAPE, ZAMBOANGA DEL SUR








Fiesta Hermosa

Every October, Zamboanga City holds a celebration in honor of Our Lady of the Pillar, the patroness of the city. Local Zamboangueños are devoted to the patroness because they believe She's performed miracles for them. You might believe in miracles too after visiting the whole fort-turned-shrine in Her honor called the Real Fuerza de Señora Virgen del Pilar.

P'gsalabuk Festival

P'gsalabuk, meaning togetherness, is celebrated in Dipolog through a festival that showcases the mix of cultures from the Muslim and Lumad people. The long celebration includes festive street dances, colorful parades, variety shows, and more.

Kinabayo Festival

Immerse yourself in a scene from the past – the Battles of Clavijo and Covadonga, as Dapitan City honors Saint James the Greater, a.k.a. "the Moor Slayer," in July. This battle is where the apparition of the saint happens, believed to be an intercession that resulted in the triumph of the Catholic faith over Mohammedanism followers. Recently, they've dialed-up the festival to add more color to this dance-drama, so be sure to catch it while you can!

Pasalamat Festival

Pasalamat, meaning thankful, is a celebration that gives thanks for the arrival of the image of Sr. Santo Niño in Pagadian City. This event starts with a procession of the Sto. Niño image, then is followed by a parade, some trade exhibits, carnival shows, and a beauty pageant.

There's nothing like the glorious rhythm of tribal drums and the unique sound of the local instrument, kulintangan, to symbolize a coming-together of diverse cultures. The Sakayan festival celebrates unity in diversity as the local term "sakayan" refers to a vehicle (usually a water craft) that everyone, regardless of culture, gets on to travel to one shared destination. If you find yourself in Isabela City, you won't want to miss this ride that brings everyone together!
