### **SUPPLY AND DELIVERY OF A3 TEAR-OFF DIVE MAPS FOR THE GO DIVING SHOW 2024**

#### **I. BACKGROUND**

Organized by two of the most influential dive publications in UK, Scuba Diver Magazine and Deeperblue.com, GO Diving Show is making a name among dive operators and aficionados. This trade and consumer event offers concepts and initiatives in the diving community that attracted 5,000 active dive visitors in the 2021 edition.

GO Diving Show is now bigger being merged with The Dive Birmingham Show as a result of the buyout of Rork Media (publisher of Scuba Diver and organiser of Go Diving Show) of The Diver Group publication (organiser of the Dive Birmingham Show).

#### **II. OBJECTIVES**

## GETTING THERE AND GOING AROUND

### ARRIVAL



The Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) in Manila is the main port of entry in the Philippines. It has four terminals that cater to domestic and international flights from the world's major airlines. It is equipped with tourist help desks, hotel and car rental services, duty-free souvenir shops, handicap assistance, and sanitation stations.

### SAFETY TIPS



Like any other city in the world, tourists should be mindful of their personal safety and belongings wherever they go. Be sure that all valuables are properly protected from loss.

Book tours only with agencies that are licensed and accredited by the Department of Tourism.

A nationwide smoking ban is being implemented prohibiting smoking within the public and enclosed public places. You may look for designated smoking spaces around your area.

### CUSTOMS



The following are allowed duty-free: reasonable quantity of clothes, jewelry, and toiletries; two (2) reams of cigarette or two (2) tins of tobacco; two (2) bottles of liquor, or wine not exceeding one (1) liter per bottle; a cash limit of USD10,000.

### TRANSPORTATION



To reach other parts of the country, you can travel by air, land, or sea. Commercial carriers have scheduled flights to major destinations and island resorts while bus terminals offer daily rides to the provinces and other cities. Make sure to check the passenger capacity, route, and schedule, of your chosen mode of transportation before booking. You can go around the city on jeepneys, metered taxis, buses, tricycles, rent-a-car services, ride hailing apps and rapid transit systems like the Metro Rail Transit (MRT) and Light Rail Transit (LRT).



**TAXI**  
You can hail one from anywhere and almost all drivers speak and understand English. Flag down rates may change so don't forget to ask your hotel what the standard charge is. Be sure the meter is turned on before you go.

### ACCOMMODATION



You can book a room in any of the country's hotels ranging from 5-star hotels to boutique hotels, and serviced apartments.

For the budget-conscious, there are hostels, B&Bs, and inns that have basic amenities like Wi-Fi, air conditioning, and hot water.

March to May - Hot and dry months

June to October - Wet season

November to February - Cool and windy

### WHAT TO WEAR



Light and breathable clothing is recommended. When visiting the mountain regions, use warm and insulated clothing.

For formal occasions, men can wear dinner jackets with ties or the Philippine barong tagalog. Women can use cocktail dresses or long gowns.

Use your discretion and wear appropriate clothing when visiting churches, temples, mosques, or other places of worship. Avoid wearing sleeveless shirts, shorts, and slippers.
